The year behind marked a significant milestone in JDA's presence in northern Afghanistan. We have successfully established our presence in Northern Afghanistan as a credible organization. Our staff, both expatriate and local are welcomed as trusted friends and competent workers whether in the field or at a school construction site. This is fundamental to long term successful development in any region. Since the organization's inception in (1994), we have always focused on long term presence with trained personnel who operate with team spirit promoting JDA's vision and values. We see the evidence of this when village elders come to us with a need for continued school construction, more water wells, health education. They know us to be approachable, willing to listen, and motivated to problem solve with them. They know from the kind of work that we do, that we understand their needs and will do all that we can in the interest of promoting healthy communities in every area of life.

This year also two new foreign staff joined us in Tashkent as part of a long-term agreement with Norwegian Lutheran Mission.

The political climate in Uzbekistan is increasingly unstable towards NGOs, yet our communities ask us for expanded programs and continued help. Keeping our staff involved in their development may lead us to establishing for-profit local businesses which have the advantage of not being associated with the west and are therefore, easier to register and license. AGRICULTURE

A grant allowed JDA's agricultural expert to implement a 4 month learning opportunity that focused on providing professors and 250 students with experience in applied agricultural research. This was conducted at the Balkh University Faculty of Agriculture in northern Afghanistan. They gained hands on knowledge by running a soybean variety trial and by conducting simple mass selection of a corn variety to improve it so that it will provide a higher yield in Afghanistan's conditions. These are skills basic to agricultural research and development. Students and staff alike gained valuable learning in plant breeding and agronomy.

Afghan students graduate with little or no practical knowledge of how to conduct even simple agricultural research. Universities, schools and learning centers throughout Afghanistan are still very much in re-development. Poor research infrastructure and limited funding keep them from providing students with up to date technology and information.

JDA received funding to study and develop systems for increased productivity and profitability in wheat-based cropping systems. The study is being jointly carried out with the Aga Khan Foundation (AKF), Cornell University, International Maize and Wheat





Improvement (CIMMYT) and Balkh Savings and Credit Union (BSCU). JDA's staff continued its focus on soybean production in northern Afghanistan, determining the best varieties for northern Afghanistan's climate and soil. JDA is also testing a wide variety of edible oilseed crops, as Afghanistan imports more than 90% of its cooking oil.

Working closely with Afghan farmers, JDA has determined that soybeans will be best utilized as an additional crop (not a replacement) and introduced in conjunction with their current farming systems. Introducing a variety that can be planted in the early summer with an early harvest will allow the farmers to continue to use the same field for winter wheat.

JDA has also experimented with a Chinese 2-wheel tractor for tilling, planting and harvesting to replace oxen, which are costly to feed throughout the year. Making this appropriate technology available to more farmers in 2006 will reduce, substantially, overall costs to the farmers.



COMMUNITY HEALTH

60 Neighborhood Health Care Topics are addressed through volunteer training, education and brochures. Topics include sanitation, hygiene, nutrition, first aid, family planning, alcohol & drug abuse, STDs and HIV/AIDS. This year the program was expanded to include classes dedicated to developing and implementing a business plan for those who wish to take part in the JDA's Micro-Credit program.

Many of the volunteers are teachers and send the brochures home with their students as reading assignments! It is a creative and effective way to get the information into the home and to the parents.

The program appeals to both the young and old and they respond to the caring warmth of our staff and to the pertinent and useful topics. Their excitement is infectious once they catch the vision for a healthier community. The program will be adding new staff in the coming year and are developing a brochure on penicillin.



WATER DEVELOPMENT

SODIS has proven to be an effective method for providing clean drinking water for people living in rural Uzbekistan. With a clear plastic soda bottle, black paint, a simple technique, and sunshine as an energy source, families can be assured of safe drinking water.

Although the population understands the need to boil water to make it clean, firewood or other energy sources are limited. Our enthusiastic and skilled trainers promote the program with demonstrations, brochures, videos and posters. The method is so simple that the children get involved and enjoy doing it.

JDA has been pioneering the SODIS method in Central Asia since 2001. Last year the program expanded to include more villages in the Ferghana and Karakalpakstan regions.



POVERTY ALLEVIATION




Loan applicants attend business training before receiving a loan from JDA's micro credit program. They are challenged to create a viable, sustainable business plan that will be successful.

The "solidarity group" (6 to 8 members who guarantee each others' loans) has proven to be an effective model for this culture. It provides an environment where members are accountable to each other. They are challenged, motivated and encouraged by the other members and each develops a desire to work hard and be successful.


The JDA loan officer also plays a decisive role by visiting members in their homes regularly, offering encouragement, answering questions and helping to solve problems.




VISION
